ur donors, volunteers and community partners ensure that Circle of Concern stands ready to serve—whether it's responding to a recession impacting our nation, a natural disaster impacting our region, or personal hardships affecting our neighbors.

And while our goal is to be here, for as long as we're needed, we want our services to truly impact those we serve. Real change is what we're seeking. So we've been "digging in" this year, taking a closer look at our programs, surveying our clients

and the volunteers who work most closely with them, examining similar organizations, building assessment tools and dreaming about the future.

Our pantry, along with our emergency rent and utility assistance program, helps to keep families safe—and intact.

At our core, we are a food pantry offering wholesome foods, so that our neighbors in need don't go hungry. Do we affect change through

our pantry? Yes. 94% of our clients report that the food we share enables them to direct their very limited dollars toward other critical expenses, like utilities, medicine and healthcare. Our pantry, along with our emergency rent and utility assistance program, helps to keep families safe—and intact.

Our newly formed Pantry Committee will soon examine ways to better serve our homeless population and those with special dietary needs. Circle's Program Committee has initiated

Gifts of money and food to Circle Of Concern are eligible for Food Pantry Tax Credits, giving back up to 50 percent of your gift in credits that directly lower your Missouri income tax bill. And you can still claim your donation for a federal tax deduction!

Individuals can earn up to \$2,500 in credits when they donate \$5,000 in cash or food. Couples filing jointly can earn up to \$5,000 in credits for gifts of \$10,000.

For the fifth time, our friends in Des Peres have canvassed neighborhoods collecting those paper and personal care products that we really can't do without, such as toilet paper, soap, laundry detergent, diapers and more. These are all items a family-in-need cannot buy with assistance like SNAP (food stamps) but are critical every day.

This fall, the group filled 86 HUGE storage bags with hundreds of these items that will help our families meet that daily need...and the Rotary plans another drive in the spring. Thank you, Des Peres Rotarians; you have, daily, become essential to us!

regular meetings and training sessions for our Reception, Intake and Case workers. In 2017, we hope to fund formal training in Motivational Interviewing—an evidence—based approach that helps clients to set and work toward personal goals.

Circle's staff and volunteers work to meet our clients' immediate needs, but also to move them beyond their current circumstances, to a place of stability and self-sufficiency. For many years we've awarded college scholarships to financially eligible high school seniors in hopes that through education, we can break the cycle of poverty. We remain committed to this effort; so much so, we've expanded the program to our adult clients in recent years; and due to an overwhelming response, we're committing more dollars for scholarships in 2017.

Circle's Career Mentorship Program pairs eager clients with working and retired professionals for personal coaching and career planning. As we "dug in" to this program this year, we formalized training, expectations and support for our mentors. Inspired by the client success stories coming from this program, we now strategize ways to grow client participation throughout the coming New Year.



We look with excitement to this holiday season and the client events that bring hope and happiness; and we look to 2017, Circle's 50th Anniversary. As we work to provide strong programs and make real change in the lives

of client families, we will be raising funds and awareness, and celebrating all that is "Circle." We thank you for being an important part of our history and we invite you to be a part of our future too.
